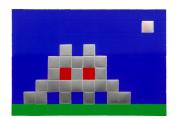

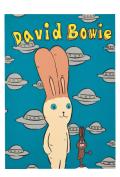

Catalogue Essay

Drawing inspiration from Japanese manga and anime from her youth, Hikari Shimoda's universe is at once disarmingly adorable and terrifying. Starry eyed children adopt heroic costumes evocative of Superman and the anime sub genre of magic wielding girls, such as Sailor Moon; while also referencing the postures of the Buddha or Kannon. In particular, Shimoda is strongly influenced by Hayao Miyazaki, the internationally acclaimed animator and co-founder of Studio Ghibli.

At first glance, Shimoda's starry-eyed, vibrant-coloured characters are sugarcoated with their 'kawaii-ness', yet yearns to express a deeper complexity of emotions from the artist:

"The character I draw is not a portrait of a specific person, but a vessel for expressing the two-sidedness and emotional complexity of human beings themselves. The eyes are a part of us that are especially expressive and I want to express human complexity by giving different brightness to the left and right eye." — Hikari Shimoda

The dichotomy between the initial cuteness of her work and the underlying darkness within stemmed from the aftermath of the Great East Japan earthquake. Nuclear power, initially commercialised as 'natural and safe' revealed its ugly underbelly, throwing into disarray the very foundations of ordinary life. Shimoda transforms senses of hopelessness and anxiety into positive imagery of bright patterns and colours. Through her frequent use of children as motifs, Shimoda openly explores the struggles and aspirations faced by adults in modern society. As viewers find themselves caught in the swirling galaxies of the children's pupils, salvation and reprieve can be found amidst the chaos of our time.

During 2005, IWC entered into a partnership with the Saint-Exupéry-d'Agay Estate whereby the heirs of Antoine de Saint-Exupéry and IWC would collaborate in various ways especially relating to its interest in aviation, resulting their first retro-style chronograph reference IW3717. A man of dreams and adventure, Antonie de Saint-Exupéry was known not only for his most famous novel Le Petit Prince, he was also a French aviator and commercial pilot responsible for airmail routes and was part of the French Airforce during WWII. Considered as Saint-Exupéry most famous work, Le Petit Prince is a story of dreams narrated by a pilot stranded in the desert which parallels the author's own experience in the Sahara Desert in 1935.

Sharing the passion of aviation and story-telling, IWC launched the firm's homage limited series of the IWC Le Petit Prince models in 2013. During the production span, all models were fitted with a desirable blue sunburst dial evoking the mystery of the night sky of the little prince. The present model IW500916 was released in 2016, a Big Pilot's watch in a limited edition with an oversized steel case permitting the use of large dials for high legibility, and a large crown for ease of setting the hacking (or stop-seconds) mechanism. Featuring a large luminescent triangle at 12 o'clock with two dots on either side, the design was intended to allow a pilot to immediately orient the watch in any position. Housed inside this timepiece is the IWC calibre 51111 that beats at 21,600 vph with a 7-days power reserve of a week-long of adventures.

Revealed on the caseback is the engraving of the famous prince in his cape and sword as a tribute to the classic tale. As quoted from Antonie de Saint-Exupéry, "Make your life a dream and a dream a reality." The present timepiece is a combination of technology and poetry, and at the same time as a reminder to pursue one's dreams. Preserved in excellent overall condition and further accompanied with its original warranty and presentation box, this is an excellent opportunity to acquire one of the IWC Le Petit Prince edition.

Born in Toba, Japan, and raised in the United States, Yoskay Yamamoto is known for his fusion of Japanese culture with American urban Pop Art, drawing inspiration from artists such as Paul Klee, Keith Haring, Robert Indiana, and Yayoi Kusama, among others. As a self-trained illustrator, Yamamoto found himself smitten with the culture of the American West Coast, thus sought to unite his diverging heritage by blending iconic pop characters with traditional, mythical Japanese elements. Often featuring characters submerged underwater, Yamamoto's works are suggestive of the broad expanse of space between the two locations, communicating both joy and melancholy as he navigates the challenges of being in between cultures.

With works across mediums such as sculpture, murals, carved figurines and toys, as well as large installations and paintings, Yamamoto unites graphic illustrative design with a highly expressive and surrealist sensibility, encouraging interaction with viewers.

Yamamoto has showcased his work in galleries and museums both domestically and internationally, with works held in the Fort Wayne Museum of Art collection. He was chosen as the official artist for Los Angeles Film Festival 2017 and in 2018 he completed a site installation and Facebook headquarters. He currently lives and works in Long Beach, California.

A prime mover of Japanese Pop Surrealism, Tokyo based artist Yosuke Ueno offers a highly elaborate personal world born from an experimental outlook not unlike that of a scientist. Bathed in a hazy cosmic glow, Ueno's is a world beyond comprehension, probing into matters of life and death as well as the timeless relationship between man and nature.

Debuting at just 16 years old in his first solo show in 1994, Ueno has made his name with uncannily beautiful artwork swarming with esoteric references, a kaleidoscopic world populated by a whole host of equally fantastic creatures. Tapping into underground culture, manga, and graffiti art, as well as pop imagery and iconography, Ueno intermingles aspects Japanese, European, and American, exploring themes of symbolism and innocence.

Citing anger as one of his main drives to create, Ueno's paintings are born from a feverish explosion of emotion, and within such an intuitive process both positive and negative energies coalesce to create highly complex worlds governed by their own logic.

Ueno's work has been included in major exhibitions in Japan such as at the Shimoni-Seki Museum and Museum of Contemporary Art Tokyo, and at the LA Art Show, Art Fair Tokyo, Artfair Taipei, amongst others. Ueno currently lives and works in Tokyo, Japan.

Catalogue Essay

Born in the idyllic seaside town of Tottori in 1990, Japanese artist Yukimasa Ida's gestural paintings focus on the concept of 'Ichi-go Ichi-e' — a once-in-a-lifetime encounter. The term itself is a cultural idiom, describing the concept of an unrepeatable moment in life. The current series, *End of today*, acts as daily journals reflecting the artist's exploration into his central concept:

"My series of small portraits are like picture diaries to me and it's a lifework. I make it a rule for me to paint one work per day when the date changes, between 11pm to 1am, that's why I titled the series 'End of today'." i

The concept emphasises both the beauty and cruelness of flowing time within a lifetime. Life itself very much equals the idea of 'Ichi-go Ichi-e'; it applies to the people we meet and the environments we live in: every person and place are constantly changing, moments fleeting.

Yukimasa Ida's works are in the famous personal collections of Yusaku Maezawa, Takashi Murakami, Leonardo DiCaprio and Jay Chou. Recent exhibitions include *Cyrstallization* (Tokyo, 2020) and *Rhapsody* (London, 2019), which included the current work. His most recent solo exhibition, *Here and Now*, opened June 26 at Mariane Ibrahim Gallery, Chicago, and closed August 14, 2021.

Contemporary British artist Dave White is renowned for his unique approach to realism. His mixed-media approach replaces mimetic accuracy with greater expression as he captures the unique character and temperament of his subjects. Using diamond dust, gloss and gold leaf, White imbues his watercolour works with a visceral tactility, bringing his animals to life in broad, spontaneous brushstrokes.

Having pioneered the 'Sneaker Art' movement in 2002, White is among the few artists to have his own signature Jordan releases, collaborating with Size? x Nike, Beams Tokyo and Kith, New York on international sneaker and tee projects. In 2018, White was featured in the 'Tongue + Chic' sneaker exhibition held by Phillips New York, in which artists such as KAWS, Hirst, and Murakami were also handpicked. White has also worked with Jaguar, Staple Clothing, and Harpers Bazaar.

Recently, with a particular focus on environmental issues, White pushes the boundaries of animal portraiture. In the eyes of his chimpanzees, dinosaurs, flamingos, and other like fauna, one finds an anthropomorphic sense of contemplation which transcends their primitive origins. With charitable collaborations and donations of his work, White has supported Virunga National Park, Tusk, Rainforest Foundation UK, and Wild Aid, further demonstrating his unwavering devotion to wildlife.

Catalogue Essay

With no topic too taboo, too gory or scatological, Joan Cornellà's universe is the very definition of tragicomedy, embodying the nihilistic absurdity of experience and existence. His deadpan humour emerges full force in his comics and paintings, which illustrate devastatingly bleak narratives in a bright palette, coupled with a host of grinning characters.

Caught in horrific situations, such as mutilation by machine gun, amputation, suicide and immolation, Cornellà's characters have it rough. Their rowboat shaped smile, plastered on taut faces passively frozen in oblivious delight, point to an almost idiotic resignation to the horrors of their existence. And yet, the current work, *Untitled #4*, is a peek behind the curtains of Cornellà's tragicomic theatre. The work reveals the reality that is contrary to the viewer's expectations: those polished black holes are no more than coverings for his real eyes. His real eye, painted with photo realistic details, is shocking when juxtaposed with the overall cartoonish simplicity of the work. It is all the more so unsettling in its piercing blue gaze, nestled within fleshy folds, and looking directly at the viewer in a subtle dismantling of the fourth wall. At once the viewer recoils with the realisation: this is an incredibly worn out person whose real eyes are not as nearly bright and attractive as it seems -- the result of the uncanny detailing of wrinkles and highlights unnatural to the chosen style. This effect is ultimately amusing, in the way one often resorts to laughter when met with the baffling and inexplicable.

Cornellà's casual displays of hyperviolence addresses contemporary issues of the subtle violences prevalent in everyday life and perpetuated, by our ignorance – being enslaved to capitalist machinery, wealth inequality, racism, sexism, and even of human loneliness. And yet, despite the grimness of his topics, Cornellà's mastery of physical comedy delivers his punchlines with lethal accuracy, and it is with immense difficulty that one keeps from laughing, albeit with a tinge of shame. Without any dialogue, the images speak for themselves through simple visual cues, demanding interpretation from viewers in order to access the point being made.

"I think we all laugh at misery. We must start from the idea that when we laugh, we laugh at someone or something. With empathy or not, there is always some degree of cruelty. In spite of that, I am aware that if one of my cartoons happened in real life I would not laugh at all." — Joan Cornellà

Internet sensation Joan Cornellà Vázquez, or better known by his first two names, was born in Barcelona in 1981. Known for his comic strips and artworks that are full of satire, Cornellà rose to fame via his colourful 6-panel comic strips originating as Facebook posts. His works have been on view across the globe in Seoul, Taipei, Bangkok, Hong Kong, Shanghai, Paris, New York and London. Joan Cornellà lives and works in Barcelona.

"My characters are somewhat sad, isolated and powerless and this is exactly how I feel sometimes. My art is as real as my spirit." — Chen Ke

As one of the most iconic female painters amongst the post 1970s generation of Chinese contemporary artists, Chen Ke has already made her mark with her distinctive oeuvre. Seeking for new breakthroughs in her career, the artist tirelessly experiments with a myriad of mediums and subject matters: whether it is her signature little girl with a button nose and melancholic expression in *Light No.2*; her series of installation works made from vintage furniture; or her large scale ink paintings that completely deviating from her previous aesthetics. The artist shows great determination in expanding the dynamics of her oeuvre, continuously garnering critical acclaim across different stages.

Embracing her identity as an artist of 'the cartoon generation', Chen Ke's little girls are inspired by art world superstars such as Takashi Murakami and Yoshitomo Nara, whose own images of young girls captured the hearts of many. The artist resonated with the populist image of Nara's and Murakami's protagonists, as they '... (were) not the kind of superior high art (you usually see). I thought (their style) was particularly good at expressing ideas directly, so I painted in this way.' i

Sleek in its execution, Chen Ke's *Light No.2* is a particularly captivating piece from the artist's oeuvre that depicts her iconic little girl with a rounded button nose, set against a dreamy painterly backdrop of teal blues, light greens, and baby yellows, glowing from within. Representing the sense of loneliness and loss coming from her generation born under the One Child Policy, Chen's works convey the complex inner turmoil of Chinese youth that are struggling to find their path in a society that once valued societal connection, but is now occupied with personal desires and material pursuits.

Immaculately redenered, Chen Ke's portraits emit an air of introspection with their looks of innocence. Similar to Nara's protagonists, the little girl in *Light No. 2* is also floating in a void of soft pastel colours that eminates the sheen and texture of fine lacquerware or polished jade, demonstrating the allure of her kaleidoscopic and dazzling world of imagination. As the artist explains herself:

"It's an imaginary little girl, kinda like another me, it was also inspired by my observation of the young people around me: whether they are having problems socializing with other people, or feeling dreamy." — Chen Ke

Catalogue Essay

"The place of children in my work is very important, in that it is these children I love the most, who inspire me, and who are at the forefront of what I create. Our vision of the world is positive: of a world without war, without children on the streets, without children mistreated, a world for children who are happy, joyful, educated and in good health." — Aboudia

Known for his graffiti inspired canvases depicting children, Aboudia repurposes found materials from the urban streets of Abidjan, where he was born in Côte d'Ivoire, West Africa. Using cardboard, charcoal, fragments of magazine ads, or newspapers—Aboudia transposes *Nouchi*, the colloquial language of the Ivory Coast that is a mixture of several Ivorian languages and French, onto his canvases, bringing street culture, voodoo iconography, and wood carvings from West Africa into dialogue with each other, showcasing his distinctive approach to figuration.

Though Aboudia's spontaneous, loose and dynamic style is rooted firmly in the street style of Abidjan, his visual language is able to translate to audiences internationally. The urban characteristics in his works recall iconic paintings of Jean-Michel Basquiat, whilst his graphic approach to figurarion and textured surfaces share similarities with Jean Dubuffet's works.

In December 2010, whilst other artists fled Abidjan during the conflict that followed Ivory Coast's presidential elections, Aboudia stayed in his studio, painting what he saw on the streets as bullets whizzed through the air. He picked materials out of rubbish bins and off the pavement, and incorporated this with a gestural application of media that powerfully articulates the harsh reality the artist has witnessed. Since then, Aboudia's reality-grounded, hauntingly moving paintings have garnered international attention, yet he insists that he is not a war painter: 'I was simply describing a situation, to create a record of my country's recent history. Artists, writers, filmmakers are spokespersons for an entire nation, their nation, and the world.' This socially motivated aspect of his practice is reflected in Aboudia's establishment of a foundation in Bingerville, Côte d'Ivoire that seeks to provide children access to healthcare and art.

Catalogue Essay

Having lived in Los Angeles, New York, London, Tokyo and Takayama, Tomokazu Matsuyama has long been interested in the dichotomy between his Japanese and American identities.

Matsuyama's hybrid works capture his personal experience navigating contemporary urban landscapes through his unique visual vocabulary, taking inspiration from traditional Japanese art, Disney animations, Western design sensibilities and colour tones, and Japanese colour schemes. His art thus attempts to find common threads between bipolar aesthetics such as Western and Eastern, ornamental and conceptual, traditional and contemporary, resulting in an alchemical explosion of different cultures.

Matsuyama has had numerous exhibitions worldwide including the Japan Society, New York; the Katzen Arts Center at American University, Washington D.C., and the Minneapolis Institute of Arts. A massive 2014 painting, *You Need to Come Closer*, has recently been acquired by LACMA. Since 2019, Matsuyama has engaged in a series of public works, from murals in The Bowery, New York, and Beverly Hills, California, to two monumental public sculptures unveiled in Tokyo in July 2020. His most recent solo exhibition has travelled to the Long Museum's Shanghai and Chongqing spaces, and he has an upcoming solo show at Zidoun-Bossuyt Gallery, Luxembourg in 2022. Moreover, his market has been heating up, with his top three auction records set within the last year.

Catalogue Essay

The jewel-like, embryonic works of Izumi Kato are expressive, emotive inquiries into human relationships and the originality of life in society today. Born in Shimane prefecture, Kato's creations embody the Shinto legends and folklore of the coastal town in western Japan known as 'the land of gods and myths'. His embrace of the fluid boundaries between the natural, human and spiritual realms manifests itself in enigmatic works with bold, simple outlines and bright jewel tones that evoke ancient totems and animist beliefs that all objects, places, creatures - even human-made works of art - possess a distinct spiritual essence.

Kato's creations particularly speak to the enchanting, otherworldly experiences of the child-heart – playfulness, whimsy, curiosity, innocence, even loneliness. A native sympathy between the liminal world of children and Kato's art is not an accident of his line and colour but at the very centre of his spirit. Deviating from the tidy and meticulous art language of his Japanese contemporaries, Kato chooses to work with materials sourced locally and used by native populations – canvas, camphor wood, fabric and even flowers. A relative latecomer to the art world, Kato made his debut at the age of thirty having worked as a manual labourer for a number of years. Embracing the Japanese concept of *en* (or 'fate') in his life and working methods, Kato adopts intuitive – even primitive – modes of production, foregoing drafts or sketches in favour of working directly onto his chosen medium, for example using latex gloves to rub oil paint directly into canvas and hand-chiseling his softwood sculptures to leave visible marks and cracks in their surfaces.

"If I understand what I am doing, I will lose my motivation to make it and the purpose of creation will be lost." — Izumi Kato

Kato's inclusion in the 2007 Venice Biennale exhibition *Think with the Senses – Feel with the Mind* propelled his career onto the international stage, and he continues to garner critical attention around the world. The artist has recently been honoured with multiple institutional solo shows at CHAT Hong Kong (2020), the Red Brick Art Museum, Beijing (2020), the Tokyo Metropolitan Teien Art Museum (2020). And the Hara Museum of Contemporary Art, Tokyo (2019).

The artist and his work

Born in the small town of Chaoshan, Guangdong, Zeng Jianyong graduated from the Chinese painting department at Huqiao University and the printmaking department at the Central Academy of Fine Arts. He then trained as an illustrator for children's books to begin with, completing several under Warner Book Publications before transitioning to focus on his own painting career.

Taking inspiration from the experiences of his own son, Zeng often depicts children and teenagers in his paintings, charged with a subdued melancholy, within landscapes awash in a hazy pastel palette evocative of the smog in Beijing. The figure's rounded faces are intricately textured by a thin film of colour, rendered in the traditional style of Chinese ink and wash painting. Their hollow gazes which pierce beyond the veneer of the painting and through the viewers themselves in a moment of bewilderment or contemplative ennui. Zeng's work intentionally juxtaposes groups of depressed children with innocent adults, espousing a sense of surreal with his unique visual compositions.

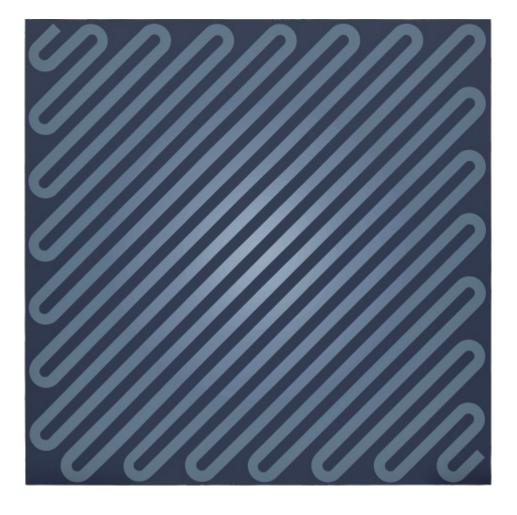

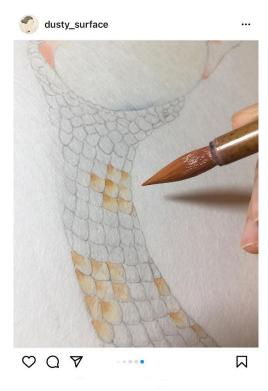

"What I like about Gongbi painting is the sense of tranquility, the repetitiveness or calmness needed during the creative process, it suits me very well." — Joey Leung

Born and raised in Hong Kong, Joey Leung graduated from the Chinese University of Hong Kong (BA in Fine Arts, 2000; MFA, 2007). In her seamless blending of tradition with modernity, East and West, Leung comments on the trials and tribulations of the urban city landscape, confronting conventional habits and beliefs to provoke a new interpretation of modern life. The juxtaposition of images and words in Leung's paintings recall the Chinese art form of Lianhuanhua (picture story book) popular during the 1920s in China, as well as Japanese manga. In sequential structure, Leung provides a strong sense of narrative in her paintings, prompting interpretation through witty poems inscribed onto the paintings in Cantonese.

Using pencil, needle pens, ink, and gouache, Leung explores cultural differences through her diverse choice of medium in addition to the form and content of her paintings, reviving the tradition of gongbi painting. Her iconic long haired girls carry an air of grace rivalling the ladies of ancient Song dynasty paintings, their melancholic expression juxtaposing the straightforward humour of the text and subject of the painting.

Filled with self deprecating humor, Leung's accompanying texts are highly self aware, and were added by the artist with the intention of better communicating her thoughts: "I used to have no inscriptions in my paintings, and only included little hints in the title; but when I drew some more complicated stories, I was thinking about how I should express it to the audience, so I simply added

text." These poems are hand written by the artist, purposely appearing as if they were printed on:"I want to make it look like it was printed on like the old days. What I find interesting is that the computer fonts are actually imitating our written characters. Then I imitate the computer fonts. When the viewer looks at them, they will be confused; the characters don't seem to be handwritten, but you also know it's handwritten; it's a blurry inbetween state." i

Joey Leung's works are in the collections of prestigious institutions such as the Hong Kong Museum of Art and the Ashmolean Museum, Oxford. Upon her graduation, Joey Leung won the prestigious Y.S. Hui Arts Award in 2000, with her first solo exhibition taking place in Galerie Martini, Hong Kong, the following year. She has since held several solo and joint exhibitions both in Hong Kong and overseas. Her most recent group exhibition will soon close at LACMA, Los Angeles on 12 December. Joey Leung is represented by Karin Weber Gallery and Grotto Fine Art in Hong Kong.

Catalogue Essay

Creating a whimsical world often depicting young girls surrounded by creatures drawn from her own imagination, Zhan Tianmu's protagonists are illuminated in a soft, cool palette. Seeing her paintings as a means of liberation and release, Zhang offers a world of reprieve, despite the complexity of experience and emotion within. The half-lidded gaze of her girl protagonists completes the dreamlike daze of her paintings, sometimes looking off to the side in languorous wonder, sometimes staring straight at the viewer. Despite the undercurrent of loneliness, Zhang's works are peaceful, with figures seemingly suspended in time and space.

As an interdisciplinary artist, Zhang works across mediums including paper clay, polymer clay, and cardboard, citing fabric as most suited to her working methods. Interestingly, Zhang recalls a particular distaste for cute characters originating early from her childhood. Her works balance a pretty delicacy with provocative titles which allude to the 'stream-of-consciousness' nature of her works, encouraging more intimate contact with her viewer as she subverts the sorrows and ugly absurdities of daily life.

Born in 1971 in Jilin, Zhan Tianmu majored in Chinese Painting at the National Huaqiao University, furthering her studies at the Central Academy of Fine Arts in mural painting. She currently lives and works in Beijing and Shenzhen.

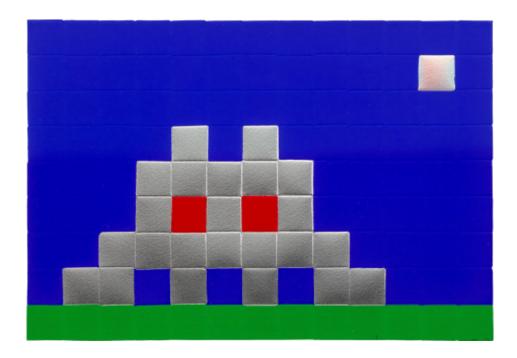

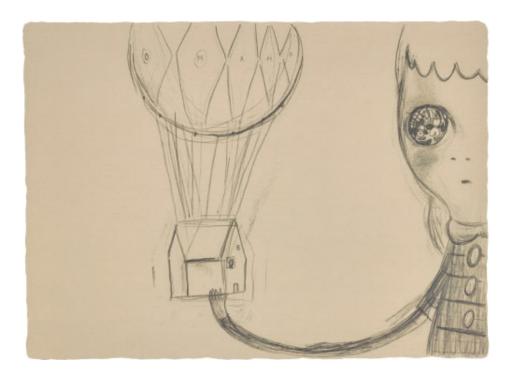

Catalogue Essay

Born in 1988 in Bangkok, Thailand, Pan Arniwat established his wood carving brand, Wood You Mind in 2019. Specialising in wooden designer toys, Arniwat has captured the attention of many around the world with his unique style. Characters from popular culture, such as Pokémon and Astroboy, as well as a variety of animals and critters, are rendered in a highly organic manner, as each contour of their rounded bodies is highlighted by the artist's rustic carving method.

With their pastel palette and softly rendered edges, the wooden characters convey the innocence and carefree nature of childhood, reinventing figures in classical books and anime. As elucidated by Parn, his minimalistic approach to these carvings enhances the work's ability to communicate with the viewer. Just as one would speak simply to a child, these characters are direct and honest, exuding no more than joy and contentment.

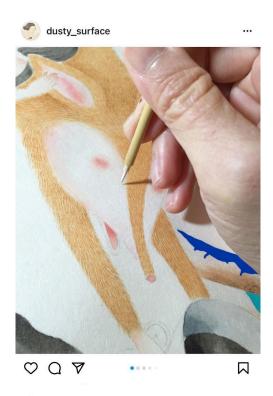

Catalogue Essay

"What I like about Gongbi painting is the sense of tranquility, the repetitiveness or calmness needed during the creative process, it suits me very well." — Joey Leung

Born and raised in Hong Kong, Joey Leung graduated from the Chinese University of Hong Kong (BA in Fine Arts, 2000; MFA, 2007). In her seamless blending of tradition with modernity, East and West, Leung comments on the trials and tribulations of the urban city landscape, confronting conventional habits and beliefs to provoke a new interpretation of modern life. The juxtaposition of images and words in Leung's paintings recall the Chinese art form of Lianhuanhua (picture story book) popular during the 1920s in China, as well as Japanese manga. In sequential structure, Leung provides a strong sense of narrative in her paintings, prompting interpretation through witty poems inscribed onto the paintings in Cantonese.

Using pencil, needle pens, ink, and gouache, Leung explores cultural differences through her diverse choice of medium in addition to the form and content of her paintings, reviving the tradition of gongbi painting. Her iconic long haired girls carry an air of grace rivalling the ladies of ancient Song dynasty paintings, their melancholic expression juxtaposing the straightforward humour of the text and subject of the painting.

Filled with self deprecating humor, Leung's accompanying texts are highly self aware, and were added by the artist with the intention of better communicating her thoughts: "I used to have no inscriptions in my paintings, and only included little hints in the title; but when I drew some more complicated stories, I was thinking about how I should express it to the audience, so I simply added

text." These poems are hand written by the artist, purposely appearing as if they were printed on:"I want to make it look like it was printed on like the old days. What I find interesting is that the computer fonts are actually imitating our written characters. Then I imitate the computer fonts. When the viewer looks at them, they will be confused; the characters don't seem to be handwritten, but you also know it's handwritten; it's a blurry inbetween state."

Joey Leung's works are in the collections of prestigious institutions such as the Hong Kong Museum of Art and the Ashmolean Museum, Oxford. Upon her graduation, Joey Leung won the prestigious Y.S. Hui Arts Award in 2000, with her first solo exhibition taking place in Galerie Martini, Hong Kong, the following year. She has since held several solo and joint exhibitions both in Hong Kong and overseas. Her most recent group exhibition will soon close at LACMA, Los Angeles on 12 December. Joey Leung is represented by Karin Weber Gallery and Grotto Fine Art in Hong Kong.

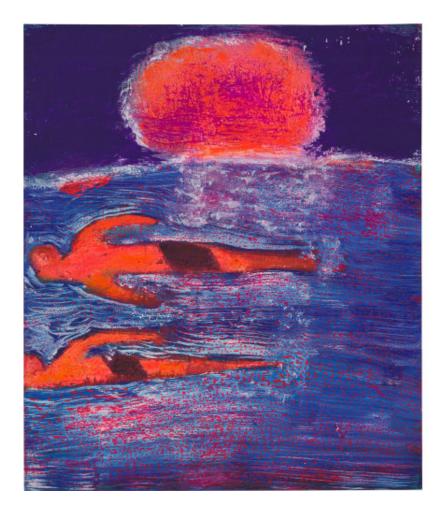

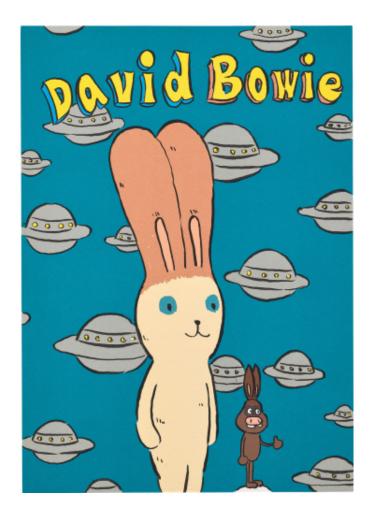
