White Angel Breadline, one of Dorothea Lange's most compelling images, has become a definitive representation of the human toll taken by the Depression. This photograph pre-dates her work for the Resettlement Administration (later the Farm Security Administration), and set the template for the humanistic approach she continued to pursue throughout her career.

In 1933, Lange operated her own portrait studio in San Francisco and catered to an affluent clientele. As she recounted many times, however, she could not ignore the growing number of newly unemployed people in the city, and she took to the street, camera in hand, to explore the situation. One early outing brought her to a breadline operated by a wealthy woman, known as the White Angel, who dispensed food to those in need. Lange exposed three negatives there, with her 3 ¼-by-4 ½ Graflex camera, each taken from a slightly different vantage point.

As evidenced by the stamps and labels on the reverse of this photograph, it was once in the files of Magnum, the collective photo agency founded in the late 1940s by Robert Capa, Henri Cartier Bresson, David 'Chim' Seymour, and other magazine photographers looking for representation outside of the conventional editorial system. Lange and her photographs were temperamentally aligned with Magnum's idealism, and she worked with the agency in the 1950s and 1960s, supplying images from her past body of work and occasionally suggesting assignments. Lange's oldest son, the writer Daniel Dixon, was employed in Magnum's New York office in 1954.

It is not known when this print of *White Angel Breadline* entered Magnum. Shortly after her death in 1965, a selection of Lange's best-known images was sent to Magnum by her assistant, Richard Conrat, with the understanding that Magnum would make high-quality copy negatives and then return the prints to Lange's studio. By 1989, it was unclear whether these materials had been returned, prompting Lange's younger son, John Dixon, to write to Magnum: 'I have not seen anything in the files which indicate one way or the other whether or not that return was accomplished. Would you please check your files and advise me of this matter? If you still have them or any other of her original prints, we, her family, would like to have them.' The Magnum label dated 1995 on the reverse of this print suggests its return was made in the subsequent decade.

The photographs in *Dorothea Lange: The Family Collection* were in the photographer's collection at the time of her death and thenceforth passed to her descendants. The images represent the entirety of Lange's career as one of the foremost documentary photographers of the 20th century, from work made before her engagement with the Resettlement Administration, later the Farm Security Administration, in the 1930s, to the travel photography that absorbed her in her final years, as well as more personal images of her family. Each print bears a Family Collection stamp on the reverse.

This photograph shows Paul Schuster Taylor, Lange's husband and collaborator, at work interviewing farm laborers in Alabama. Taylor (1895-1984) was an agricultural economist and his socially progressive politics led him to a variety of positions in state and federal agencies focused on helping the rural poor. A self-taught photographer, Taylor used the camera in his work to provide documents that buttressed his field notes. He first encountered Lange's photographs at Willard Van Dyke's exhibition of her work at his Oakland Gallery in 1934. Impressed, Taylor asked to use her images in an article he was writing for *Survey Graphic* magazine entitled *San Francisco and the General Strike*. He hired Lange to photograph the Unemployed Exchange Association, and in 1935 Lange joined Taylor on the staff of the California State Emergency Relief Administration, Division for Rural Rehabilitation, where they developed a close working relationship in which their respective skills complemented each other. They married in 1935. In 1939 they coauthored the seminal pictorial study of the Depression, *An American Exodus: A Record of Human Erosion*. They continued working together, formally and informally, for the rest of Lange's life.

Their marriage brought together their two families: Lange's sons John and Daniel, and Taylor's three children. As the couple aged, their home became a meeting place for their children and grandchildren. Lange's grandchildren recall that after Lange's death, Taylor remained a devoted and supportive grandfather.

The photographs in *Dorothea Lange: The Family Collection* were in the photographer's collection at the time of her death and thenceforth passed to her descendants. The images represent the entirety of Lange's career as one of the foremost documentary photographers of the 20th century, from work made before her engagement with the Resettlement Administration, later the Farm Security Administration, in the 1930s, to the travel photography that absorbed her in her final years, as well as more personal images of her family. Each print bears a Family Collection stamp on the reverse.

In 1955, Lange became interested in documenting the criminal justice system, particularly the role of public defenders hired by the state to defend accused persons unable to pay for their own defense. She pitched the story to *LIFE* magazine, which gave her the go-ahead to start shooting. Lange found a compelling protagonist for this project: Martin Pulich, an earnest young public defender in Alameda County, California. Lange quickly immersed herself in the subject matter, shadowing Pulich through his meetings with clients and court appearances, developing a deep understanding of the complex and impersonal judicial system, and reinforcing her belief in the need for free legal representation for the accused. While the most memorable photographs from this series capture the intensity of the courtroom, and the fierce drive of Pulich's advocacy for his clients, she also showed the dim holding cells, the paddy wagons, and the bureaucratic procedures that governed the lives of prisoner and counsel alike, creating an immersive context for the human drama of her story.

Ultimately, and to Lange's dismay, *LIFE* declined to publish the story. However, other outlets picked up *Public Defender* and the images appeared in newspapers as well as in publications by the Legal Aid Society and the National Lawyers' Guild. The uniform mounts and typed captions of several of the prints in this group suggest they were used for publication and/or exhibition. Today, *Public Defender* is regarded as one of the great achievements of Lange's post-war period and an exemplary demonstration of photography's ability to capture a complex and multi-layered situation.

As of this writing, it is believed that the 16 photographs offered here comprise the largest *Public Defender* group to appear at auction.




